
Culver City Schools are among the best in the State, providing top-quality education for our students.

A potential bond measure would provide CCUSD with the funding needed to make critical safety improvements to our schools and prepare our students for future success.


Providing a 21st-Century Education in a Safe Learning Environment

Local Funds Under Local Control

All funding acquired from a potential bond measure would stay in our schools under local control, used exclusively for school improvements.

- ★ Under no circumstances could these funds be taken away by the State
- ★ No bond funds could be used for district staff salaries, benefits, pensions, or to increase school administration
- ★ The School Board is considering that the cost of this new measure would be limited to no more than \$48 per \$100,000 of a home's assessed value (not market value) annually. This would raise \$106 million in funds for urgently needed repairs
- ★ Any measure would require independent citizen oversight, annual public audits, and community reports

Complete Repairs at Aging Schools to Keep our Students Safe

Urgent repairs are needed at our aging schools to ensure every student has access to safe, well-maintained classrooms:

- ★ Repair or replace deteriorating school floors, walls, windows, leaky roofs, plumbing systems, and restrooms
- ★ Bring schools up to modern standards for fire and earthquake safety, remove asbestos, fungus, and other hazardous materials, and install needed fencing, lighting, locks, and security to keep students safe
- ★ Install or upgrade air conditioning, heating, and air filtration to ensure healthy learning environments

Classroom, Lab, and Technology Upgrades to Provide a 21st-Century Education

Our students need access to upgraded classrooms, labs, and school technology to gain the high-level math and science skills that will prepare them for 21st-century jobs. A potential bond measure would allow the District to:

- ★ Upgrade and repair aging school electrical systems, and replace science labs and equipment so that our schools can offer modern classroom technology and computer science to students
- ★ Provide the technological equipment and the modern classrooms necessary to ensure that all of our students are college and career ready
- ★ Provide permanent classrooms for our students in the continuation high school
