Call to Order

Board President Dr. Beagles-Roos called the meeting of the Culver City Unified School District Board of Education to order at 6:00 p.m. The Board adjourned to Closed Session at 6:01 p.m. and reconvened the public meeting at 7:04 p.m. with all Board members in attendance. Mrs. Debbie Hamme led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Report from Closed Session

Dr. Beagles-Roos reported that the Governing Board met in Closed Session regarding issues listed on today's Closed Session agenda and announced that no reportable actions were taken.

8. Adoption of Agenda

Mr. Zeidman requested to move item 14.2b up on the agenda to follow item 10.1. It was moved by Mr. Zeidman and seconded by Mr. Gourley to approve the agenda as amended. The motion was unanimously approved.

9. Consent Agenda

Dr. Beagles-Roos called the Consent Agenda and asked if any member of the audience or the Board wished to withdraw any item. No items were withdrawn. It was moved by Mr. Gourley and seconded by Dr. Russell to approve Consent Agenda Items 9.1 through 9.5 as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

10. Awards, Recognitions and Presentations

10.1 Spotlight on Education - Office of Child Development

Mrs. Audrey Stephens, Director of the Office of Child Development, presented a DVD entitled, "Mathematics in The Early Years: Math is Everywhere." The DVD included images of preschool students discovering mathematical ideas and teachers fostering young students' information mathematical knowledge. Board members thanked Mrs. Stephens for her presentation, and commended the staff at the Office of Child Development for all of their hard work.

14.2b Approval is Recommended for the Office of Child Development Agency Annual Report to the California Department of Education

It was moved by Mrs. Davis and seconded by Mr. Zeidman that the Board approve Office of Child Development Agency Annual Report to the California Department of Education as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

9.5 Approval is Recommended for the Classified Personnel Reports No. 16

Mrs. Davis mentioned that Consent Item 9.5 was supposed to be withdrawn from the agenda to pull item 2.1 off of Classified Personnel Report #16. Dr. Beagles-Roos suggested the Board re-vote on the item. It was moved by Mrs. Gourley and seconded by Mrs. Davis to revote on Consent Item 9.5 with the amendment that item 2.1 on the report be removed. The motion was unanimously granted to approve the Classified Personnel Report No. 16 as amended.

10.2 Title I Funding Update

Ms. Laura introduced Mrs. Leslie Lockhart, Director of Special Projects, who gave a presentation on Title I and American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 funds. Mrs. Lockhart gave an overview of Title I funding and explained the uses of Title I and ARRA funds. Alan Elmont suggested funding programs already in place and not starting any new programs with one-time money. Further discussion ensued regarding where cuts would be made, and what positions or programs funding could bring back. Mr. Zeidman requested a detailed restructuring plan that the Board could review.

11. Public Recognition

11.1 Superintendent's Report

Dr. Coté reported how well the District was represented at the Title I Academic Achievement Awards dinner that took place in Anaheim, and she gave an update on her attendance at the California City School Superintendents' Spring Conference. She announced that State Superintendent O'Connell released the annual dropout report and the newspapers should report a 2007-2008 statewide dropout rate of 20.1%. The District's dropout rate for the last two years has remained at a low 2.5%. Dr. Coté spoke about how she attributes quite a bit of the low dropout rate to the District's excellent alternative school, Culver Park.

11.2 Assistant Superintendents' Reports

Ms. Laura provided an update on the recent Anti-Bullying Task Force meeting, and she mentioned that a survey will be issued to students in the fall. Ms. Laura reported that an administrative retreat is currently being planned.

Mr. El Fattal reported on ARRA funds that have been identified for Special Education, and mentioned possible dates and amounts of funding that might be coming from the federal government. Mr. El Fattal also briefly spoke about the upcoming Special Election.

Mrs. Jaffe thanked the Education Foundation for the wonderful job that was done with the Tribute to the Stars, and she mentioned some of the highlights.

11.3 Members of the Audience

Dr. Russell suggested reducing the amount of time for the speakers to two minutes since there were a large number of speaker cards. All Board members agreed.

Members of the audience spoke about:

- Marta Zaragoza spoke about seeking an attorney to handle a matter regarding her son. She asked the Board to remember that the students are their constituents, and submitted a letter to begin her due process.
- Dianna Castro gave the Board background information on the Secretary 1 position at the high school, and asked that they consider reclassifying the position. Dr. Beagles-Roos asked that staff respond to her questions after the meeting.
- Karlo Silbiger spoke on behalf of the Culver City Democratic Club. Mr. Silbiger extended an invitation to the Board and audience members to attend the club's next meeting the following night which would include youth activism as a topic.
- Michael Laase commented that Tribute to the Stars was a great success, and that she was surprised that in
 this economy more money was raised this year than last year. Mrs. Laase commented on a rumor she had
 heard. She stated Mrs. Jaffe was an excellent contributor to the District. Dr. Russell and Dr. BeaglesRoos informed Mrs. Laase that she could not mention employee names when commenting during public
 recognition.

- Dan O'Brien commented that after hearing Dr. Coté's report it makes him want to attend more meetings. He stated the community wants to do what is best for the kids. He encouraged the Board to keep the cuts as far away from the classrooms as possible.
- Joanna Maxwell, who is an Instructional Aide, spoke about the special education students' needs and behavioral issues.
- Patricia Marquez spoke about how the Instructional Assistants are needed and urged the Board to rethink how they are making decisions.
- Isabel Musquiz spoke about how important the Special Education Instructional Assistants are and shared some of her experiences.
- William Lockhart, a Special Education Teacher, commented on how the special education population has grown and how cutting the work hours of the assistants affect the students.
- Student Eddie Zuniga spoke in favor of keeping the Instructional Assistants, and spoke about how important taking the CAHSEE is to him.
- Sean Herbert spoke in favor of keeping the Instructional Assistants and shared experiences of their hard work
- Abel Navar urged the Board not to cut the Instructional Assistants for special education.
- Kathy McConkey extended an invitation to everyone for AVPA's JAVA Gala benefit on May 22nd at Robert Frost Auditorium.
- Alejandro Guzman spoke in favor of keeping the Instructional Assistants.
- Juliann MacNicoll spoke in favor of keeping the Instructional Assistants.
- Andrew Burke said that it is imperative that the assistants stay in the classroom and that the students have individualized attention.
- Shirley Herbert stated that she would rather see everyone take a pay cut rather than cut the Instructional Assistants.
- Mary Carney urged the Board not to make cuts.
- Davie Mielke stated that now the Board is starting to see the human effects of the cuts, and the Board should not cut any hours from the Instructional Assistants.
- Ronald Combs urged the Board not to cut back on the services for special education students, and keep the funding for the aides.
- Royel Beard urged the Board not to cut the aides.
- Andrea Stevenson thanked the Board for keeping the aides at the elementary schools, and urged them to keep the Instructional Assistants that are currently on the reduction list.
- Alana Shapiro asked the Board to reconsider cutting any of the Instructional Assistants.
- Diane Kaiser spoke as an advocate for the special education students.

Dr. Beagles-Roos thanked all of the students that came to the meeting and shared their comments.

11.4 Student Representatives' Reports

Middle School Student Representative

Sibyl Courey, Culver City Middle School Student Representative, reported on activities at Culver City Middle School, including tickets being sold for the Spring Dance; the upcoming Spirit Week events; the auditions were going to being held for the 2009 Variety Show; Earth Day event on May 29th; the June 3rd Jeopardy-style Contest; eighth grade Grad Night; and the elections for the ninth grade class.

Culver Park Student Representative

Jessica Romo, Culver Park High School Student Representative, was not present.

Culver City High School Student Representative/Student Board Member

Opal Dillard, Student Board Member, reported on activities at Culver City High School, including the ASB election results with Victor Burnett winning for President and Noemi Kolansky winning for Vice President; upcoming plans for Summerfest; the UCLA Blood Drive; how the students are handling the issue of having no

receptionist in the Main Office; block scheduling for testing; and she shared how the students have been trying to include the special education students in more activities.

11.5 Members of the Board

Board Members spoke about:

- Mr. Gourley thanked everyone that came to the meeting and spoke. He stated the Board has gone over the reductions and the Board is going to do what they can do for funding.
- Dr. Russell commended Miss Dillard for keeping an open mind on her college choices. He requested additional information on the Special Education Instructional Assistants and the process that the District takes in the reductions. Dr. Russell stated that he likes to think that the Special Education population has always been included in activities at the school sites, and he stated that he was proud to be in attendance at the Title 1 Achievement Awards where Linwood E. Howe and La Ballona Elementary Schools were honored. Dr. Russell commented that he is against having one assistant superintendent in the District because that was attempted years ago and it did not work very well. He also inquired as to how the one time stimulus funds will be spent.
- Mr. Zeidman agreed with Dr. Russell about getting additional information on the process of cutting employees, and he announced that City Council applied for a grant to assist with traffic on the Elenda gateway. Mr. Zeidman reported on his attendance at the Tribute to the Stars event.
- Mrs. Davis thanked everyone for attending the meeting and speaking. She reported on her attendance at the Title 1 Achievement Awards and mentioned it was great to have Christine Collins, Principal at La Ballona Elementary, recognized. Mrs. Davis commented that she had purchased a ticket for the Tribute to the Stars but was unable to attend, and thanked the Education Foundation for their hard work on the event every year. Mrs. Davis stated if any salary cuts were to be made, the cuts should affect all employees and not just management. Salary cuts should not just be for one group or one individual, and that some teachers' salaries are higher than the assistant superintendents. Mr. Gourley and Mrs. Davis agreed with Dr. Russell's request.
- Dr. Beagles-Roos congratulated Miss Dillard on her university acceptances and her commitment to the
 students in special education. Dr. Beagles-Roos commented on the success of the Tribute to the Stars and
 how the events were continuing to make money even in these economic times; and she reported on her
 attendance at the Title 1 Achievement Awards. Dr. Beagles-Roos said the District will have limited
 resources next year and the Board will work to help all of the students.

12. Information Items

12.1 <u>First Reading of Revised Board Policy/Administrative Regulation 5144.1, Students – Suspension</u> and Expulsion/Due Process

Mr. Zeidman requested to have this item removed from the agenda. Mrs. Davis seconded the request. Mr. Zeidman requested that it be modified and then brought back to a later meeting. Further discussion ensued. Dr. Beagles-Roos requested to have the Board Policy presented before the Administrative Regulation. The vote was 5 - Ayes and 0 - Nays to postpone the reading of the Board Policy and Administrative Regulation.

12.2 First Reading of Revised Administrative Regulation 4161.8, Family Medical Leave

Mrs. Jaffe presented the information on the revised Administrative Regulation and explained that it was being brought forward to meet compliance. Mrs. Jaffe explained that the Administrative Regulation will also be presented to the ACE and CCFT unions. The Board suggested revisions. The Administrative Regulation will be brought back for adoption.

13. Recess

The Board recessed at 9:14 p.m. and reconvened at 9:30 p.m.

14. Action Items

14.1 Superintendent's Items

14.1a Approval is Recommended for the Renewed Contract for the Position of Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources

It was moved by Mr. Gourley and seconded by Mr. Zeidman that the Board approve the Renewed Contract for the Position of Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources as amended. Karlo Silbiger commented that with the budget cuts he was concerned about renewing the contract for two years, and suggested a renewal term of one year. He also stated that even though the salary is public information it should be included in the contract presented along with the fringe benefits. Robert Gray stated that his comments were being directed at management in general and not at Mrs. Jaffe's contract specifically. He felt that management should lead by example and take a salary cut. Jamie Wallace encouraged people to look beyond there own schools and have an interest in the District as a whole. She also urged management to take a voluntary salary cut of five percent. Roger Maxwell commented on the perception in the community about the District and suggested not voting at this meeting on the budget cuts. Mr. Zeidman stated that the budget cuts are his second biggest fear. An even bigger fear is having a budget crisis without Mrs. Jaffe. He would like to see everyone take a vote on a salary cut and not just one group. Dr. Russell stated he had the same concerns that other people have, and that you cannot ask one group or one person to take a salary cut. If the District is going to cut salaries, everyone would need to participate. Mrs. Davis agreed. The motion was unanimously approved.

14.2 Education Services Items

14.2a <u>Approval is Recommended for Second Reading and Adoption of Revised Board Policy 5030 –</u> Wellness Policy

It was moved by Mr. Zeidman and seconded by Dr. Russell that the Board adopt the Revised Board Policy 5030, Students – Wellness as presented. The motion was unanimously approved.

14.3 Business Items

14.3a Approval is Recommended for 2009-2010 Expenditure Reductions

Mr. El Fattal presented the information. Mr. Gourley asked for clarification on the items that were presented. Mr. Zeidman suggested postponing a vote. Dr. Coté urged the Board to make a decision, and explained that in order to proceed with the restructuring process action needed to be taken on this item. Further discussion ensued. Mr. Gourley stated that he was still against the cuts until the results are in after the May 19th election. Dr. Beagles-Roos moved to proceed by each individual line item. Mr. Gourley stated he was against voting on all of the items, and he objected going through the items because the classified personnel had left the meeting. The original motion was terminated for lack of a second from Board members. Dr. Beagles-Roos confirmed that the Board did not want to vote line by line. Board members agreed they did not want to take that action. Dr. Coté requested if a plan is presented for restructuring with the budget cuts and without the budget cuts, can the reduction list be brought back. Board members approved her request.

15. Board Business

15.1 <u>Discussion of Board Bylaw 9100, Organization</u>

Karlo Silbiger provided information on how the Bylaw came to be. He stated that he hated the idea of members being bypassed and everyone should have their turn to serve as president. Mr. Zeidman stated that he requested this Bylaw be brought forward for discussion. He suggested that every year the Board elect the president. Dr. Russell stated he thought it was nice that there was a rotation. Mr. Zeidman provided his revisions to provide clarity. The Bylaw will be brought back for a first reading.

15.2 Discussion of Community Budget Advisory Committee Role and Function

Mr. Zeidman stated that he would like to set up a sub-committee to work through some of the issues regarding CBAC and bring the information back to the Board. Board members agreed. Further discussion ensued. Karlo Silbiger strongly recommended revamping the information and gave his suggestions. He also stated he did not

think it was appropriate to have a staff member as the Chair. Michael Laase apologized to Mr. Gourley for saying earlier that he never attended any of the Tribute to the Stars events. Mrs. Laase commented that the Board needed to spend funds that are currently there for the natatorium and decide on another project. Robert Gray stated that he thought there needed to be a large number of parents on CBAC. He thought CBAC did a good job with the budget and gave his suggestions on restructuring the committee. Alan Elmont commented that CBAC does have some organizational issues and stated what he felt could be done to revamp the committee. He thanked the Board for listening to their recommendations. Janet Chabola agreed that improvements could be made and urged the Board to forget the two year rule. She stated that CBAC needed to have an attendance policy and that more information needs to be available to the committee. Dr. Beagles-Roos called for any volunteers for the subcommittee. Mr. Zeidman and Dr. Russell volunteered.

• Alan Elmont commented on the responsibility of the District and spoke about transparency. He stated that staff needs to bring forth the organizational plans for the District.

16.2 Members of the Board

Members of the Board spoke about:

- Dr. Russell complimented the District on how well budget issues were handled after reading the latest articles regarding other Districts. He also felt there needed to be more discussions on quality education.
- Mr. Gourley commented that he promised George Laase that he would mention the Board Health and Welfare benefits, and told Mr. Laase that he could submit what he thinks the chart should look like.
- Dr. Beagles-Roos announced that the Parcel Tax meeting would be held on May 20th and suggested that two Board members attend. Dr. Beagles-Roos and Mr. Zeidman agreed to attend.

Los Angeles County Plan for Expelled Pupils (Education Code Section 48926)

Introduction

The Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts within the county, have developed the following county-wide plan for providing educational services to expelled pupils within the county pursuant to California Education Code, Section 48926. In addressing the needs of all expelled pupils, the county-wide plan shall:

- enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils;
- · identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils;
- identify strategies for filling those gaps in services; and,
- identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their required rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

To address the needs of expelled pupils, a number of alternative education programs have been developed by local school districts and the Los Angeles County Office of Education to provide continuing educational opportunities.

Section 48916.1 provides that at the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board shall ensure that an education program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Any educational program provided pursuant to this section may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.

To address the needs of expelled pupils, a number of alternative education programs have been developed by local school districts and the Los Angeles County Office of Education to provide continuing educational opportunities.

Profile

The Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) is the nation's largest regional education agency. Los Angeles County, the most populous county in the nation, has over 10 million residents, including about 1.7 million students in 80 school districts. Our largest district, Los Angeles Unified School District, has an enrollment of 841,518 students, while our smallest, Hughes-Elizabeth Lakes Union School District, has 352 students. Our service area encompasses 88 cities and 4,084 square miles.

LACOE Vision Statement

LACOE is a premier provider of integrated, educational programs and services from birth to adulthood in a richly diverse and multicultural global environment.

LACOE uses a variety of service delivery systems to eliminate the educational barriers associated with poverty and racial divisiveness in education, enabling students to exceed state and national standards. These services include universal, quality, early childhood education, effective data driven programs for all students, and state of the art technical assistance.

LACOE organizes its infrastructure to provide leadership in creating unique, nationally recognized models in education, including models for innovative staff development and training. LACOE earns the public's confidence by: making the school the hub of the community, making the most efficient use of financial resources, bridging the "digital divide" in technology access and content, and developing collaborative partnerships for students, parents, and community. LACOE embraces a culture of diversity that promotes an inclusive, prosperous learning and workplace environment.

The Los Angeles County Office of Education promotes excellence by providing comprehensive educational services to all communities.

Division of Alternative Education

Students at risk of dropping out and those with special interests or talents benefit from an alternative education setting. The Division of Alternative Education's (DAE) focus is on creating unique learning environments where students can achieve behavior, academic and career goals. DAE administers alternative programs that serve over 4,000 juvenile offenders, expelled and truant students, pregnant and parenting teens, as well as young people who are gifted in the performing and visual arts. DAE is responsible for placement and service of school district-referred expelled students.

Division of Student Support Services

The Division of Student Support Services (SSS) serves school districts and LACOE programs, and provides technical assistance in the areas of student discipline, pupil records, custody of minors, education for homeless children and youth, compulsory attendance and truancy reduction, counseling and guidance, dental disease prevention, health services, gang prevention and intervention, school violence reduction, safe school planning, and emergency response and crisis intervention. SSS is responsible for handling expulsion appeals to the county board of education of students expelled from the school districts, and providing support for students, parents, and school districts who are participating in the expulsion appeal process.

Educational Alternatives for Expelled Pupils

School districts located within Los Angeles County provide a number of options for expelled pupils, depending on the specific violation of Sections 48900, 48900.2, 48900.3, 48900.4 and 48900.7 of the California Education Code. The alternative education program to which an expelled pupil may be assigned is preceded by a decision of the local governing board which may provide for one of the following expulsion orders which describes the students' educational placement:

- 1. Suspended enforcement of the expulsion order with placement on the same school campus [EC § 48917 (a)];
- 2. Suspended enforcement of the expulsion order with placement on a different school campus within the district or an alternative program such as opportunity or continuation school programs [EC § 48917(a)];
- 3. Expulsion with a referral to a District Community Day School program, if available [EC § 48660]; or,
- 4. Expulsion with a referral to a county community school or other appropriate program operated by the Los Angeles County Office of Education [EC § 1981(c)].

A pupil who is expelled for violation for an act listed in subdivision (c) of EC § 48915 (mandatory expulsion section), shall be assigned to a program of study that meets all of the following conditions:

- (1) Is appropriately prepared to accommodate pupils who exhibit discipline problems.
- (2) Is not provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school.
- (3) Is not housed at the school site attended by the pupil at the time of suspension.

At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Any education program provided may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.

District Operated Programs

The range of alternative programs currently offered by school districts throughout Los Angeles County includes the following options:

- · Community Day Schools;
- Independent Study (offered in conjunction with a classroom option);
- Opportunity School/Class;
- Continuation High School;
- · Adult Education Programs; and,
- Special Education.

If a school district is unable to provide a suitable program or if the expelled pupil fails to meet the term and conditions of his or her rehabilitation plan or if the student continues to pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board, the district may refer the expelled pupil to the Los Angeles County Office of Education for possible placement in a program operated by the Division of Alternative Education (DAE).

County Operated Programs

The Los Angeles County Office of Education currently provides a variety of alternative education programs that are designed to help pupils:

- take a renewed interest in school and learning;
- · attend school consistently; and,
- set and attain academic and career goals.

Specifically, these programs are designed to serve:

- Students who are having trouble at home or school;
- Expecting and Parenting Teens;
- Homeless and Foster Children and Youth;
- Students who are on probation or students who need to work full-time to support themselves and/or their families; and,
- Students who have been expelled and for whom a district operated education program is not available.

Programs designed to serve the above identified pupil populations include those operated by the LACOE Division of Alternative Education (DAE) include:

- Community Day Schools;
- Independent Study (operated in conjunction with a classroom option);
- California School Age Families Education Program (Cal-SAFE);
- Partnership Programs

As previously stated, at the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided for the pupil subject to the expulsion order. For districts that may be unable to provide pupils who commit serious behavior violations with an alternative program that meets the restrictive requirements of California Education Code Section 48915 (d) (see appendix), selected county programs may provide viable options.

It is anticipated that the majority of expelled pupils who are referred to the county office for placement in an alternative program will be assigned to a *community day school program*. Community day schools operated by the county are designed to provide interventions for elementary school pupils (primarily in grades 4, 5 and 6); middle school pupils, grades 7 and 8; and high school pupils in grades 9 through 12.

Educational Service Gaps and Strategies to Address Service Gaps

Section 48926 of the California Education Code provides that each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980: ... shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. One of the required elements of the plan is to identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps.

To address this element and identify additional service needs to expelled pupils, a survey of all school districts in Los Angeles County was conducted (see appendix: AB 922 District Questionnaire).

As a result of that survey, the following service gaps were identified, including a discussion of each issue along with a proposed strategy:

Service Gap No. 1 - Education Programs for Expelled Special Education Students

Discussion: Fifteen school districts expressed a need for more Special Education alternatives for expelled students, including Emotionally Disturbed (ED), Resource Specialist Program (RSP) and Special Day Class (SDC - 3 districts expressed a need). Four districts are interested in bus transportation for Special Education students to LACOE programs.

Proposed Strategy: Expelled Special Education students from the school districts could be served by LACOE Special Education programs, depending on the goals and objectives of the Individualized Education Plan (IEP), and whether LACOE has services to meet their needs. Districts can send the usual Referral for Services for Expelled Students to LACOE (See Appendix), and also request that LACOE staff participate in the transition IEP meeting. Although ED students are more difficult to serve, other students, RSP or SDC, might be able to be served.

Service Gap No. 2 - Additional Programs for Grades K-8

Discussion: Of the 75 school districts that responded to the survey, 20 requested additional LACOE alternative programs, or assistance in organizing consortiums of school district programs. Six districts felt that there were not enough students to support a single district program, and were interested in a possible consortium, including Alhambra, Bassett, Burbank, Castaic, Newhall, and Pomona. Eight districts were interested in more K-6 programs. Two districts requested grades 6-8 programs, six wanted more K-6 programs, two wanted 9-12 programs, one a 7-8 program, one a 5-8 program, one a 5-6 program, and one a K-8 site specifically serving the Azusa, Covina, Charter Oak, and West Covina school districts region. Three districts expressed a need for bus transportation to LACOE programs

Proposed Strategy: The referral of expelled students in grade 6 to LACOE programs occur infrequently, and grades 5 and lower rarely takes place. The LACOE Elementary Academy of the South Bay Community Day School remains the only LACOE classroom alternative in the county for grades K-6, and additional programs may be prohibitive due to insufficient numbers of expelled students. The Division of Alternative Education (DAE) has experienced recent closures of community day school programs, limiting the possibility of expanded programs. DAE will explore the possibility of programs that would serve grades 7-9, to prevent the enrollment of middle school students with older high school students. Districts can consider also consider forming consortiums, for the purpose of sharing alternative programs. The Division of Student Support Services (SSS) holds regular regional meetings with school district Child Welfare and Attendance (CWA) and Student Support Services personnel, and could assist in organizing consortiums. The Los Angeles County School Attendance Review Board (SARB), also administered by SSS, could also assist, since many districts are already working together in consortiums

for SARB. Students in grades 6-8 can also be served using LACOE or district independent study programs, with students meeting with a teacher three to five times per week.

Other School District Comments

School districts commented that LACOE programs have been an asset and support to their students, in particular the Elementary Academy, Santa Clarita Academy, Boys Republic, and Jonas Salk Community Day Schools. Although some commented on a delay in enrollment of expelled students, others felt that communication with DAE staff has improved, including regular face-to-face meetings with the Regional Director.

Alternative Placements for Pupils who Fail to Meet the Terms and Conditions of their Rehabilitation Plan or who Pose a Danger to Others

California Education Code, Section 48926 requires the county-wide plan to further identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

In Los Angeles County, expelled pupils who are unsuccessful in a district operated community day school and/or who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils may be referred to a county community day school or other appropriate alternative program operated by the county office of education.

Options for students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan may, in select cases, include referral and placement in a juvenile hall setting or juvenile camp or in select cases, a transfer to a program operated by an adjacent county office of education.

Currently, the Los Angeles County Office of Education does not have any formal agreements with adjacent county offices of education.

Contract for Alternative Services

To further address the requirements of Section 48926 of the California Education Code, and to ensure that an educational program is provided for all expelled pupils, referred to and accepted by the County, the Division of Alternative Education (DAE) will enter into a contract with each participating school district to identify agreed-to responsibilities for serving expelled pupils, including those served in both regular and special education programs. A plan to address any identified service gaps will be included in the contract.

Appendix

California Education Code Section 48915 (d)

- (d) The governing board shall order a pupil expelled upon finding that the pupil committed an act listed in subdivision (c), and shall refer that pupil to a program of study that meets all of the following conditions:
 - (1) Is appropriately prepared to accommodate pupils who exhibit discipline problems.
- (2) Is not provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school.
 - (3) Is not housed at the school site attended by the pupil at the time of suspension.

California Education Code Section 48915 (f)

(f) The governing board shall refer a pupil who has been expelled pursuant to subdivision (b) or (e) to a program of study which meets all of the conditions specified in subdivision (d).

Notwithstanding this subdivision, with respect to a pupil expelled pursuant to subdivision (e), if the county superintendent of schools certifies that an alternative program of study is not available at a site away from a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or an elementary school, and that the only option for placement is at another comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or another elementary school, the pupil may be referred to a program of study that is provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at an elementary school.

California Education Code Section 48915.01

If the governing board of a school district has established a community day school pursuant to Section 48661 on the same site as a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school, the governing board does not have to meet the condition in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d) of Section 48915 when the board, pursuant to subdivision (f) of Section 48915, refers a pupil to a program of study and that program of study is at the community day school. All the other conditions of subdivision (d) of Section 48915 are applicable to the referral as required by subdivision (f) of Section 48915.

California Education Code Section 48916.1

- (a) At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an education program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Except for pupils expelled pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 48915, the governing board of a school district is required to implement the provisions of this section only to the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose in the annual Budget Act or other legislation, or both.
- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (a) may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.
- (c) Any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) shall not be situated within or on the grounds of the school from which the pupil was expelled.
- (d) If the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order was expelled from any of kindergarten or grades 1 to 6, inclusive, the educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) shall not be combined or merged with educational programs offered to pupils in any of grades 7 to 12, inclusive. The district or county program is the only program required to be provided to expelled pupils as determined by the governing board of the school district.
 - (e) (1) Each school district shall maintain the following data:
 - (A) The number of pupils recommended for expulsion.
 - (B) The grounds for each recommended expulsion.
 - (C) Whether the pupil was subsequently expelled.
 - (D) Whether the expulsion order was suspended.
 - (E) The type of referral made after the expulsion.
 - (F) The disposition of the pupil after the end of the period of expulsion.
- (2) The Superintendent may require a school district to report this data as part of the coordinated compliance review. If a school district does not report outcome data as required by this subdivision, the Superintendent may not apportion any further money to the school district pursuant to Section 48664 until the school district is in compliance with this subdivision. Before withholding the apportionment of funds to a school district pursuant to this subdivision, the Superintendent shall give written notice to the governing board of the school district that the school district has

failed to report the data required by paragraph (1) and that the school district has 30 calendar days from the date of the written notice of noncompliance to report the requested data and thereby avoid the withholding of the apportionment of funds.

(f) If the county superintendent of schools is unable for any reason to serve the expelled pupils of a school district within the county, the governing board of that school district may enter into an agreement with a county superintendent of schools in another county to provide education services for the district's expelled pupils.

California Education Code Section 48926

Each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. The plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the county board of education.

The plan shall enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils, identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps. The plan shall also identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

Each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts, shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the county plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in the county no later than June 30, 1997, and shall submit a triennial update to the plan to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, including the outcome data pursuant to Section 48916.1, on June 30th thereafter.

COUNTYWIDE PLANS FOR PROVISION OF EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO EXPELLED STUDENTS - QUESTIONNAIRE – SUMMARY OF DATA

February 20, 2009

Introduction

The survey was provided to all school district superintendents, with additional copies provided to the director of pupil personnel services, supervisor of child welfare and attendance, and director of alternative education of each of the districts. Of the 80 districts receiving the survey, 74 completed the survey.

Current Educational Alternatives Available

Community Day Schools

Districts use both their own community day school (CDS) and LACOE CDS programs as placements for expelled students. District CDS programs cannot be located on or adjacent to a K-12 educational program.

- Twenty nine out of eighty districts reported that they operate a district CDS, fourteen for grades 7-8, three K-6, two K-8, one 5-8, and one 6-8. Twenty four district programs were grades 9-12.
- The following LACOE CDS programs are used by districts (number of times reported by each district in parentheses): Boys Republic, Monrovia (3), Pico Rivera Bermudez (3), Elementary CDS South Bay (7), Downey (1), Eastern Whittier Franklin (4), Compton Hope (1), Hawthorne Jonas Salk (5), Pomona Academic Arts (1), Redondo Beach Riviera (3), Santa Clarita Academy (1), Compton Tri Community (1), Not named (26) = 56 responses

Opportunity Programs

Some districts operate opportunity programs, minimum day programs housed on K-12 sites, as an alternative for expelled students.

• District Opportunity Programs: grades K-8 (1), 4-6 (1), 7-8(9), 9-12 (9) = 20 responses

Continuation High Schools

Continuation high schools were used by fifteen districts for expelled students.

Special Education

One district has a Special Day Class for expelled students. Two districts refer students to LACOE Pace.

Independent Study Programs

Districts that did not have any other alternative programs referred students to their own independent study program, or a LACOE independent study program.

- LACOE Independent Study Strategy (ISS): West Covina (3), Not named (2) = 5 responses
- District ISS: 7-8 (1), K-12 or Not Named (61) = 62 responses

Other Alternative Programs

Charter schools and private schools were among other alternatives for expelled students.

Opportunities for Learning Charter (10), Other school district (1), Opportunity transfer (2), Adult School (1), Home Teacher (4), private school (1), Ventura COE (1), Options For Youth Charter (11), SEA Charter School (16), West Covina Del Norte ROP (5), Orange County Horizons (1) = 53 responses

Have these strategies/services been successful? If not, what were the obstacles or gaps?

Forty five of the districts surveyed felt that the available alternative programs were successful most of the time.

- Two districts did not have any expulsions this past school year, one district had one expulsion, and three had three expulsions
- Lack of Special Education and K-8 alternative programs for expelled students were the major obstacles or gaps identified

Comments on Service Gap No. 1 - More Special Education/Emotionally Disturbed (ED)/SDC programs

Fourteen districts expressed a need for more Special Education alternatives for expelled students, including ED, Resource Specialist Program (RSP) and Special Day Class (SDC - 3 districts). Four districts are interested in bus transportation for Special Education students to LACOE programs.

Comments on Service Gap No. 2 - More K-8 Alternative Programs

Of the 75 school districts that responded to the survey, 20 requested additional LACOE alternative programs, or consortiums of school district programs.

- Six districts felt that there were not enough students to support a single district program, and were interested in a possible consortium, including Alhambra, Bassett, Burbank, Castaic, Newhall, and Pomona
- Eight districts were interested in more K-6 programs
- Two districts requested grades 6-8 programs, six wanted more K-6 programs, two wanted 9-12 programs, one a 7-8 program, one a 5-8 program, one a 5-6 program, and one a K-8 site specifically serving the Azusa, Covina, Charter Oak, and West Covina school districts region
- Three districts expressed a need for bus transportation to LACOE programs

Suggestions or strategies for filling any service gaps which limit your ability to ensure the availability of educational services for expelled students

Thirteen districts were apparently satisfied with their alternative program options, and did not have any suggestions. The following were major suggestions:

- Nineteen again requested more K-8 alternative programs
- Eight would like to see more SDC services
- Four districts were interested in partnering with other districts or LACOE to create programs
- Two suggested using non-public schools
- Three districts would like LACOE to provide bus tokens to students attending LACOE schools
- Two districts found waiting lists to be long at LACOE programs, while five found a gap in enrolling students in LACOE programs in a timely manner. Five districts (3 district CDS programs, 2 LACOE CDS programs), thought that waiting lists were too long at CDS sites.

Alternative placements for students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of the expulsion rehabilitation plan or pose a danger to other district students as determined by the governing board

- Nineteen districts refer students to LACOE programs
- Ten districts continue to enforce the expulsion order until the student meets all terms and conditions
- Seven refer students to independent study, while two refer students to non public schools
- Two districts amend the original expulsion order, or will re-enroll a student with conditions, similar to a suspended expulsion order

• Three districts would like LACOE DAE to better communicate when they have students who are failing, and prior to dropping the student, see if alternative placements or other means or correction such as counseling or attendance interventions can be exhausted.

12.2 <u>First Reading of Revised Board Policy 5144.1, Students – Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process</u>

It is recommended practice that the Board of Education regularly review Board Policies/Administrative Regulations that are significant to the operation of the district. A revised Board Policy on Students – Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process is being presented for review.

Students BP 5144.1(a)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS

The Governing Board has established policies and standards of behavior in order to promote learning and protect the safety and well-being of all students. When these policies and standards are violated, it may be necessary to suspend or expel a student from regular classroom instruction.

(cf. 5144 - Discipline)

Suspended or expelled students shall be denied the privilege of participation in all extracurricular activities during the period of suspension or expulsion.

(cf. 6145 - Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities)

Except where suspension for a first offense is warranted in accordance with law, suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction fail to bring about proper conduct. (Education Code 48900.5)

Expulsion is an action taken by the Board for severe or prolonged breaches of discipline by a student. Except for single acts of a grave nature, expulsion **shall be** is used only when there is a history of misconduct, when other forms of discipline, including suspension, have failed to bring about proper conduct, or when the student's presence causes a continuing danger to him/herself self or others. (Education Code 48915)

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be <u>those</u> specified in <u>law and/or</u> administrative regulation.

Suspended or expelled students shall be excluded from all school-related extracurricular activities during the suspension or expulsion.

cf. 6145 - Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

Zero Tolerance

The Board supports a zero tolerance approach to serious offenses in accordance with state and federal law. This approach makes the removal of potentially dangerous students from the classroom a top priority. It and ensures the standardized fair and equal treatment of all students and requires that all offenders be punished to the fullest extent allowed by law. Staff shall immediately report to the Superintendent or designee any incidence of offenses specified in

Zero Tolerance (continued)

law, Board policy and administrative regulation as cause for suspension or expulsion. The Superintendent or designee shall notify staff, students and parent/guardians about the district's zero tolerance policy, and the consequences which may result from student offenses. He/she shall also ensure strict enforcement of this policy.

Student Due Process

The Board shall provide for the fair and equitable treatment of students facing suspension and expulsion by affording them their due process rights under the law. The Superintendent or designee shall comply with procedures for notices and appeals as specified in administrative regulation and/<u>or</u> law. (Education Code 48911, 48915, 48915.5)

(cf. 5119 - Students Expelled from Other Districts)
(cf. 5144.2 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process (Individuals with Disabilities))

On-Campus Program

Supervised Suspension Classroom

The Board recognizes that students who are suspended from school <u>often</u> frequently have no supervision or guidance during the school hours when they are off campus <u>and may fall behind</u> <u>in the coursework</u>. The Board believes that, in many cases, it would be better to <u>manage</u> address the student's <u>misconduct behavior</u> by keeping the student at school and providing him/her with supervision that is separated from the regular classroom.

The Superintendent or designee shall <u>may</u> establish a supervised <u>classroom</u> in house suspension program which meets the requirements of law for students suspended <u>for any of the reasons</u> <u>enumerated in Education Code 48900 and 48900.2</u>, who pose no imminent danger or threat at school, and for whom an expulsion action has not been initiated.

School may implement, in place of a supervised suspension classroom program, programs involving The Superintendent or designee shall examine alternatives to off-eampus suspension and may establish a suspension-program which involves progressive discipline during the school day on eampus; use of conferences between staff, parents/guardians and students; detention; student study teams or other assessment-related teams; and/or referral to school support services staff. The use of such alternatives does not preclude off-campus suspensions.

Students BP 5144.1(c)

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS (continued)

Required Parental Attendance

The Board believes that parental involvement plays an important role in the resolution of classroom behavior problems. The Board expects that teachers will communicate with parents/guardians when behavior problems arise.

Whenever a student is suspended from a class <u>by a teacher</u> because he/she committed an obscene act, engaged in habitual profanity or vulgarity, disrupted school activities, or otherwise willfully defied valid staff authority, the teacher of the class from which the student was suspended may <u>provide require</u> that the student's parent/guardian attend a portion of a school day in that <u>the</u> class <u>from which the student was suspended</u>. (<u>Education Code 48900.1</u>)

After completing the classroom visit and before leaving school premises, the parent/guardian also shall meet with the principal or designee. (Education Code 48900.1) The Board encourages teachers, b Before requiring parental attendance, to the teacher shall make reasonable efforts to have the parent/guardian visit the class voluntarily. The teacher also may inform the parent/guardian about available resources and parent education opportunities. Teachers should reserve the option of required parental attendance for cases in which they have determined that it is the best strategy to promote positive interaction between the student and the parent/guardian and to improve classroom behavior.

The teacher shall apply this policy uniformly to all students within the classroom. This policy shall apply only to a parent/guardian who lives with the student. (Education Code 48900.1)

When a teacher requires parental attendance, the principal shall send a written notice to the parent/guardian stating that the parent/guardian's attendance is pursuant to law.

(Education Code 48900.1) Parental attendance may be requested on the day The notice shall specify that the attendance may be on either the date the student is scheduled to return returns to class or within one week thereafter.

A parent/guardian who has received a written notice shall attend a class as specified in the notice. After completing the classroom visit and before leaving school premises, the parent/guardian also shall meet with the principal or designee. (Education Code 48900.1)

The principal or designee shall contact any parents/guardians who does not respond to the request requirement to attend school. The Board recognizes that parental parent/guardian compliance with this policy may be delayed, modified or prevented for reasons such as serious illness/injury/disability, absence from town, or inability to get certain release time from work.

Required Parental Attendance (continued)

District regulations and school-site rules for student discipline shall include procedures for implementing parental attendance requirements. <u>Parents/guardians shall be notified of this policy prior to its implementation. (Education Code 48900.1)</u>

Students whose parents/guardians do not comply with school attendance requests shall not be detained from class/school attendance or penalized in any way.

Decision Not to Enforce Expulsion Order

The order for expulsion may be suspended by the Board, on case-by-case basis, pursuant to the requirements of law.

12.3 First Reading of New Board Policy 5141.33, Students - Head Lice

It is recommended practice that the Board of Education regularly review Board Policies/Administrative Regulations that are significant to the operation of the district. A new Board Policy on Students – Head Lice is being presented for review.

Students BP 5141.33(a)

HEAD LICE

The Board of Education believes that the district's head lice management program should emphasize the correct diagnosis and treatment of head lice in order to minimize disruption of the education process and to reduce the number of student absences resulting from infestation. In consultation with the school nurse, the Superintendent or designee may establish a routine screening program to help prevent the spread of head lice.

School employees shall report all suspected cases of head lice to the school nurse or designee as soon as possible. The nurse or designee shall examine the student and other students who are siblings of the affected student or members of the same household.

If a student is found with active, adult head lice, he/she shall be excluded from attendance. The parent/guardian of an excluded student shall receive information about recommended treatment procedures and sources of further information. The student shall be allowed to return to school the next day and shall be checked by the nurse or designee before returning to class. Once he/she is determined to be free of lice, the student shall be rechecked weekly for up to six weeks.

The Superintendent or designee shall send home the notification required by law for excluded students. (Education Code 48213)

The principal and school nurse shall work with the parents/guardians of any student who has been deemed to be a chronic head lice case in order to help minimize the student's absences from school.

When two or more students in any class have been identified as having an infestation of active adult head lice, all students in the class shall be examined. In consultation with the school nurse, the principal may also send information about head lice home to all parents/guardians of the students in that class.

14.1a Resolution #33-2008/2009 Board of Education Candidate Statements Resolution

The Election Code permits the District to require each candidate to pay, at the time of filing, his or her pro rata share of the printing, handling, and mailing costs of a candidate's statement. By adopting this approach, the District will avoid the administrative burden of paying the Registrar-Recorder for candidates' statements and then turning around and billing individual candidates.

The law also requires the Board to set the maximum word limitation on the length of the candidate's statement. The options available for maximum word limitation are 200 or 400 words. Because of the desire to keep costs at a minimum, the Board has set a maximum word limitation of 200.
