

<u>AB 32</u> Reduce GHG emissions to 1990 levels by 2020 80% below 1990 levels by 2050

AB 939 & AB 341 75% waste diversion by 2020

CCUSD is leading!

New solar installation equals the carbon offset of planting 5,300 trees PER YEAR for the next 30 YEARS

Solar on the main campus: over \$8 Million guaranteed to be added to the general fund with no new or increased taxes.

5 Years	\$2.0 - \$2.1 million
25 Years	\$8.2 - \$12.3 million

4) Bring Your Own Bottle!


Use refillable water bottles instead of single-use plastic bottles.

Goal is a uniform, two-bin system district-wide


- blue mixed recycling & black trash, side-by-side everywhere
- good, clear signage
- adding compost bins in lunch rooms!











- >80% of recycling waste is mixed paper
- ~5-fold increase in recycling after GREEN⁵ campaigr
- Recycling pickups increased to 2x/week

In collaboration with Culver City... So long Styrofoam! Hello Composting!

Styrofoam/ Polystyrene :

- EPA says likely Carcinogen
- creation is heavily polluting
- made from petroleum
- does not biodegrade
- takes 30% of landfill space

As of Oct. 1st, all CCUSD elementary school children are eating off **new compostable paper trays**!

2012-13 CCUSD: A leader in sustainability

- \$23k CalRecycle grant: recycling bins in all Elementary Schools, District Office and Office of Child Development
- GREEN⁵ grew at Lin Howe, started at Farragut and El Marino, recruited for La Ballona and El Rincon

2013-14 will be even better...


- Applied for 2nd CalRecycle grant to fund bins for Middle and High Schools
- Phased out Styrofoam
- Food waste program kicked off
- Solar power installation
- Hydration stations in progress


2013-2014 Opportunities

- Recycling bins and GREEN⁵ campaign in Middle School, High School, Culver Park High School, and Adult School (if awarded CalRecycle grant)
- Grades of Green Zero lunch challenges
- PowerSave Schools alliance program (no cost to district)
- Sun Power led tours & assemblies for High School
- Potential for expanded sustainability education (e.g., solar lesson plans, interactive website, solar kit, job training)
- Investment in energy efficiency via Prop 39 funding
